Garth Greenwell is the author of *What Belongs to You*, which won the British Book Award for Debut of the Year, was longlisted for the National Book Award, and was a finalist for six other awards, including the PEN/Faulkner Award and the *Los Angeles Times* Book Prize. A *New York Times Book Review* Editors' Choice, it was named a Best Book of 2016 by over fifty publications in nine countries, and is being translated into fourteen languages. His fiction has appeared in *The New Yorker, The Paris Review, A Public Space*, and *VICE*, and he has written criticism for *The New Yorker*, the *London Review of Books*, and the *New York Times Book Review*, among others. He lives in Iowa City.

Immersed in the daily rhythms of hospital life, forcibly broken out of typical routines, our protagonist, who has long taken his body for granted—or at worst, resented it—now experiences what it's like to live in a body that is acutely unwell. And as he grapples with this, he wonders, have I lived a meaningful life?

A deeply humane contemplation on mortality, caregiving, and the power of art, *Small Rain* is a luminous, singular novel.

How It Works Out follows the arc of a relationship by running the couple through a gauntlet of hypotheticals. How might things have played out between them in this universe, or that one? Each installment offers an alternate lens through which we observe Myriam and Allison: What if they became mothers by finding a baby in an alley? If the only cure for Myriam's depression was Allison's flesh? How much darker—or sexier—would their dynamic be if one were a CEO and the other a lowly employee?

How It Works Out deviates from autofiction's trademark realism and veers sharply from traditional 'otherness' narratives, where too many marginalized writers have been relegated. The book is more in the vein of Miranda July: surreal, and funny, with a very serious core. It belongs in conversation with some of the most original and acclaimed books in recent memory: the examination of a destructive queer relationship in Carmen Maria Machado's *In the Dream House*; the hilarious, self-deprecating autofiction of Elif Batuman's *The Idiot*; the strange and character-driven stories in Ottessa Moshfegh's *Homesick for Another World*; and the precise attention to sentences in Garth Greenwell's *Cleanness*.

Cold Victory is set in Finland in the immediate aftermath of WWII. Two former soldiers — one American, one Russian — are reunited at a diplomatic party. They had initially met each other in the brief window when the two nations were fighting for common purpose. But as the Cold War sets in, they find themselves on opposite sides of political tensions.

After several drinks too many they agree to a cross-country skiing race, which initially starts as an innocuous test of skills and endurance until the local papers pick up on the competition. Once revealed, the race becomes a matter of national pride. The stakes are high, with potentially lethal consequences.

But he encloses a bedtime story he asks the doctor to read aloud to her, about an Architect who goes to extraordinary lengths to protect a little Princess from the radicality of his own structure. The next day a second story arrives, about a Ballet Master who develops a new position of the feet, far simpler and more natural than the original five, but which his ballerina wife, for reasons of her own, pretends is beyond her powers. As the stories continue on alphabetically-C for Choirmaster, D for Duchess, all the way to Z for Zionist-they begin interweaving until a single picture emerges, an indictment of a decadent, death-obsessed, oversexed empire rapidly falling to pieces... Of artists who ape the innocence of children and scientists who insist that children are anything but innocent... And of Gretel's own mother, who will do whatever it takes to sing on stage at the City Theater... Is it any wonder that this world—soon to vanish anyway in a war to end all wars—was one from which Gretel's father wished to shelter her?



On a sultry summer night in Paris, two women meet in line at an ice cream kiosk on the lle de la Cité. One is tall, fair, striking, with an indeterminate accent. The other, a troubled American TV star, is hiding her beauty and identity under a shapeless sweatshirt, wearing sunglasses even in the darkness. When leering male tourists hassle the pair, the blonde pulls out a knife and a sisterhood is born. Both women have been victims of male violence, and both are warriors-one trained and calculating, one instinctually ferocious. They each think they know who they are dealing with. But both are very, very wrong.

In a story that unfolds with unexpected humor and the pace of a thriller, acclaimed novelist Helen Schulman lays bare what happens to women—no matter how fortunate they may appear to be on the surface—whose lives have been warped by brutality and misogyny. The issues are universal, but the core of the story is intimate: a passionate exploration of love, betrayal, and survival. *Lucky Dogs* asks and answers a shattering question: How could one woman so utterly betray another?



Most days, Magda is fine. The clutch of anxious Manhattan therapy patients who depend on her to cure their long-term habits? Fine. Attempts to avoid all discussion of her upcoming 70th birthday? Fine. The tentative truce she's reached with her best friend Sigrid's widower, Fred? Fine. Magda has her routines. She has other people's lives to fix. She's fine. A wry meditation on grief, love, aging, and the boundlessness of female friendship, *Temporary Measures* shows the exculpatory power of trying to live even after the people you love are gone. Fans of Andrew Sean Greer's *Less*, Sigrid Nunez's *The Friend*, Patrica Highsmith's *The Price Of Salt*, and Jonas Jonasson's *The 100-Year-Old Man Who Climbed Out The Window And Disappeared* will delight in this coming-of-age story with a twist.



A deeply moving debut novel, charting a single extraordinary life across nearly seventy years, from Cuba to New York to Montana to Florida.

A child is born in 1931, in Kansas City, Missouri, the third son of an overbearing father. This boy, Gregory, known as Gigi, is a paragon: a star athlete, a crack shot, bright and handsome, 'built like a pocket battleship', and his father's favourite child.

In 2001, a woman, Gloria, dies in a Miami women's correctional institution. Bipolar, complexly transgender, Gloria had, by the time she died, undergone countless electroshock treatments in an attempt to "cure" herself of the gender dysphoria she had experienced since childhood.

It's an extraordinary life by any standard but Gloria's surname was Hemingway, and her father a byword for masculinity. Born into a family dogged by suicide, living through mockery and shame, and ending up as the butt of jokes by many a journalist and biographer, their life was, in many ways, a tragedy. But in the face of such adversity, Gregory's survival and transformation in Gloria was also a miracle.





2008: Fourteen-year-old Alva has always longed for the America she's seen in movies. Raised in Shanghai by her American expat mother, she never knew her Chinese father, and dreamed of one day returning to her mother's home country. But when Sloan marries their wealthy Chinese landlord, Lu Fang, Alva plots her way to the next best thing: the American School in Shanghai. Upon admission, though, Alva is surprised to discover an institution run by an elitist community of expat teens and the ever-wilder thrills of a city where foreigners can ostensibly act as they please.

1985: In the seaside city of Qingdao, Lu Fang is a young, married man and lowly clerk in a shipping yard. Though he once dreamed of a bright future, he is one of many casualties in his country's harsh political reforms. But when China opens its doors to the first wave of foreigners in decades, Lu Fang meets an American woman who makes him question his status in life.

In a stunning reversal of the east-to-west immigrant narrative and set against China's economic rise, *River East, River West* is an intimate drama and a sharp social novel about a nation changing. Alternating between Alva and Lu Fang's points of view, this a profoundly moving exploration of race and class, cultural identity and belonging, and the often-false promise of the American Dream.



Lee Buck left Appalachia at eighteen without a backward glance. Feeling chastened and untethered, Lee shows up on her grandmother Belva's porch unannounced. Belva is there waiting; her magic having told her long ago that her granddaughter would return. As Lee begins to settle herself back in to the life and family she left behind, Belva and her circle of women continue to call upon the magic of the land to solve the community's woes. As Lee searches for answers, she will go down a rabbit hole of strange phenomena and family secrets that force her to reckon with her own demons and rediscover her fury and power in order to protect her family and the community.

Inspired by the author's own Appalachian Virginia family, and especially her grandmother who practiced Appalachian folk magic, *Strange Folk* marries a love of that beautiful land with the witchy traditions of Alice Hoffman and the confined terror of the best contemporary gothic novels.

These and other characters reconfigure their lives and learn how to go on, after Annie.

Written in Quindlen's emotionally resonant voice and with her deep and generous understanding of the desires and feelings of ordinary people, this beautiful novel about loss is also about finding, including the ways that, through adversity, people can grow, and come to a stronger understanding of themselves and others. As the *New York Times* said about Quindlen's fiction, "Where so much is about what vanishes, there is also a deep beating heart of what also stays."





Above all, he explores previous crisis moments in American history and asks whether the rise of Trumpism is a temporary phenomenon constructed entirely around a single individual, or whether it is a larger political force that is here to stay.

This is an elegant and deeply informed synthesis of history and politics and ideas that sheds important new light on this crucial moment.

Dr. Katalin Karikó had an unlikely journey. The daughter of a butcher in postwar communist Hungary, Karikó grew up in a one-room home that lacked running water, where the family grew their own vegetables. She saw the wonder of science and nature all around her and was determined to become a scientist. That determination eventually took her to the United States, where she arrived as a post-doctoral fellow in 1985 with \$1,200 sewn into her toddler's teddy bear and a dream to remake medicine.

Karikó worked in obscurity, battled cockroaches in a windowless lab, and faced outright derision and even deportation threats from bosses and colleagues. She balked as prestigious research institutions increasingly conflated science and money. Despite setbacks, she never wavered in her belief that an ephemeral and underappreciated molecule called messenger RNA could change the world. Karikó believed that someday mRNA might transform ordinary cells into tiny factories capable of producing their own medicines on demand. She sacrificed nearly everything for this dream, but these obstacles only motivated her, and eventually, she achieved it.

Karikó's three-decades-long investigation into mRNA ultimately led to a staggering achievement: vaccines that would save millions of lives from COVID-19. These vaccines are just the beginning of mRNA's potential. Today, the medical community eagerly awaits more mRNA vaccines for the flu, HIV, and other emerging infectious diseases.

Breaking Through explores the questions: How do you keep believing in yourself, and your work, even as others refuse to see your potential? How much is too much to sacrifice for a dream? Karikó's inspirational memoir isn't just the story of an extraordinary woman; it's an indictment of close-minded thinking and a testament to one woman's commitment to laboring intensely in obscurity not with the intent of ever being recognized, but because she believed her work might help save lives in a culture that is more driven by prestige, power, and privilege.



Where the Rivers Meet is a memoir from the perspective of the author's mother, Chue, a Hmong refugee from Laos, "a descendant of women who were considered bad luck."

In the 1960s, when Chue was born, the US was actively recruiting Hmong Laotians to assist with CIA efforts in Laos's Secret War. By the time Chue was a teenager, the US had completely vacated Laos, and the country erupted into genocidal attacks on the Hmong people, who were perceived as traitorous for their involvement. Fearing vengeful soldiers looking to take their lives, Chue and her family quickly fled their village for the jungle, leaving all that they knew behind. Perpetually on the run, the family was often on the brink of starvation, and death loomed. During this tumultuous period, Chue met her husband, Bee, and unwittingly left her mother behind forever when she escaped to a refugee camp with his family, a mistake she would regret for the rest of her life. There, Chue, Bee, and their daughters—one of whom is the author of this proposal lived in a state of constant fear and hunger until they finally made it to America.

The determined couple enrolled in high school classes despite being in their late twenties and worked grueling factory jobs to provide for their family. Yet most who meet Chue know nothing of her extraordinary resilience and traumatic past. In *Where the Rivers Meet*, Kao Kalia Yang sheds light on the incredible love and loss of her mother's life and an important undocumented history with tenderness and unvarnished clarity, while offering readers insight into America's Secret War in Laos. In doing so, she excavates the plight of many refugees, who suffer silently and are often overlooked as one of the essential foundations of this country.

Ford's *Somebody's Daughter* layered with the irreverent wit and tenderness found in Deesha Philyaw's *The Secret Lives of Church Ladies*. *This Is Your Mother* is about determining where your mother ends and where you begin, and letting go enough to be able to see who you are in this world because of her and without her.







Reggie Watts is weird. But you knew that. Anyone who's seen his multifaceted entirely improvised comedy and music shows know that. Reggie Watts is also from the town of Great Falls, MT.

These two facts are not unrelated.

Watts grew up in Montana in the 80's, half French, half American, half white, half black, speaking a bunch of different languages and slipping between the orchestra geeks and the football jocks until he finally found a squad of fellow misfits with an affinity for trouble. It was a wide-open time and place that invited freedom and exploration — as well as car theft and the not infrequent use of recreational cough syrup. And it helped him become the uniquely strange voice he is today.

In *Great Falls, MT* takes us through his story, hitting on the culture shock he experienced after moving from Europe to the heart of America, where he was called racial slurs by neighbours but wasn't black enough for his father's extended family. Where he fought with his authoritarian dad, built a new family of anti-establishment, post-punk oddballs — and ultimately knew he had to leave. But after Watt's career exploded in Seattle and New York, ultimately scoring him a nightly place next to James Corden on *The Late Late Show*, he found himself drawn back to his hometown after the deaths of his parents. This is his love letter to the town that made him. But like love itself, it's messy and complicated and dirty and beautiful—as weird and wonderful as Watts himself.
